The Power Plant's Summer 2017 Season continues a year of unique programming that takes Canada's sesquicentennial and the gallery's 30th anniversary year as its point of departure.

This Summer, The Power Plant is thrilled to present a major solo show by Ydessa Hendeles, who began in the early 1990s to incorporate her own artistic projects into her exhibition program at Toronto's Ydessa Hendeles Art Foundation. Hendeles explores perceptions of difference and diversity, assembling objects and artefacts into contemporary fables about the way representation and distortion, appropriation and assimilation can filter group and individual identities. Hendeles has fashioned her own distinctive space in the contemporary art world. We are therefore not only incredibly pleased to be hosting the first survey of Hendeles' work in Canada, but on this momentous occasion, to also present a narrative that is an expressive reflection on the pertinent issues and topics of our time.

In addition to this major exhibition, The Power Plant continues to present public programs that provide numerous opportunities for the public to engage deeper with the artwork, makers and producers, and other cultural figures. Visitors can learn more about Ydessa Hendeles' exhibition from the guest speakers of our Sunday Scene series of talks, who range from artists and curators, to historians and writers. Children ages 7 to 12 will have the opportunity to create artwork inspired by the exhibition in our bimonthly Power Kids art workshops. New to this season is a pair of Writing

Workshop hosted by David Best, where participants will be invited to consider perspectives on outsiders and insiders and author their own pieces of fiction. Award-winning dancer and choreographer Arthur Stashak also returns after his Summer 2016 performance, and will share a dance piece inspired by Hendeles' artworks. Last but not least, we invite our guests to drop by for our weekly Power Tours where, each Saturday, they will have the opportunity to hear our Gallery Attendants discuss the many facets of the exhibition.

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

Barbara Edwards CONTEM PORARY Ydessa Hendeles explores perceptions of difference and diversity, assembling objects and artefacts into contemporary fables about the way representation and distortion, appropriation and assimilation can filter group and individual identities. For her first retrospective exhibition at a public institution in Canada, The Power Plant will display a selection of her artworks drawn from the past decade.

While the art works in *The Milliner's Daughter* are informed by Hendeles' own personal and familial history, they also invite viewers to find points that resonate or connect with their own lives: the exhibition thus puts a graphic focus on their own stories, fostering a relationship with the audience that is engaging and never passive.

Presented over both floors of the gallery, *The Milliner's Daughter* offers a single, multi-layered narrative.





Included is From her wooden sleep... (2013), centred around a group of wooden artists' manikins composed in an unsettling tableau vivant. Sitting on benches arranged on the gallery floor rather than displayed on plinths, the manikins form a distinct community whose intense focus and collective gaze challenge visitors to consider and attempt to understand their relationship to the other occupants of the same space. Also part of this exhibition are THE BIRD THAT MADE THE BREEZE TO BLOW (2006-11), Crypt (2016), Canadian Child (2009), The Dead Jumbo. (2011) and Marburg! The Early Bird! (2008-16).

For this first survey of her work, Hendeles has also created a new element, *Blue Beard* (2016), in The Power Plant's Fleck Clerestory to provide a dramatic and evocative portal to the exhibition. Through the lens of cultural objects and icons, the narrative that unfolds through the galleries conjures a storyline about the power dynamics in relations between

Ydessa Hendeles is a pioneering exponent of curating as a creative artistic practice. Blurring the borders between collector, curator and artist, she has fashioned her own distinctive space in the contemporary art world.

Beginning in the early 1990s, Hendeles began to incorporate her own artistic projects into her exhibition program at the Ydessa Hendeles Art Foundation in Toronto and continued to do so until the gallery closed in 2012, after 25 years and the passing of her mother. Hendeles' psychologically charged works have been exhibited at: New Museum, New York (2016); Tel Aviv Museum of Art, Israel (2016); Kunsthaus Hamburg, Germany (2016); Institute of Contemporary Arts, London (2015); König Galerie, Berlin (2012); Andrea Rosen Gallery, New York (2011); Marburger Kunstverein, Marburg, Germany (2010); Gwangju Biennale, South Korea (2010); National Gallery of Canada, Ottawa (2004); and Haus der Kunst, Munich, Germany (2003).

Ydessa Hendeles is represented by Barbara Edwards Contemporary, Toronto, where her recent work, Death to Pigs, was exhibited in 2016. She now divides her time between studios in Toronto and New York.



Ydessa Hendeles has created an installation titled From her wooden sleep... in which wooden manikin represent people – some insiders, some outsiders – but the manikins are mostly monochromatic. After discussing the contextual importance of Hendeles' installation, we will design and make marionette shadow puppets out of paper and cardboard using all the colours of the rainbow as a symbol of inclusion!

Manikins Come to Life!

Sunday, 23 July 2017, 3-5 PM

The manikins in Ydessa Hendeles' The Milliner's Daughter appear as if they have been frozen in a tableau vivant: a living picture. After viewing and talking about the manikins in the exhibition, we will work in small groups – inspired by performance art - to invent a story, and design and make props from mixed media. Then, using our props, we will pose as living models in our own tableaux vivants. Each group will be photographed in one (or more) pose(s), and we will share those pictures with you!

Family Trees

Sunday, 13 August 2017, 3-5 PM

Ydessa Hendeles' The Milliner's Daughter includes a photograph of the artist at age 6, taken by her father soon after her family immigrated to Canada. Inspired by the artist's story of migration, this program will reflect your family's growth. Each participant, working closely with their adult companions, will create a colourful tree structure that will grow and change as they learn about their family members. After choosing what kind of tree your family might resemble, use wire and wood to build the main structure and add small leaves or fruits to represent family members.

Rebuilding What's Broken

Ydessa Hendeles is not just an artist, but a collector and curator as well! She often collects objects and then organizes these objects to present a new narrative or idea. In this workshop, we will recontextualize a collection of repurposed children's toys, using them as the base materials for an artwork. Participants will challenge themselves by creating assemblage sculptures with different elements in only one chosen colour. Their sculpture will tell a story or create a larger form that has never existed before



Anyone can be welcomed in some circles and turned away from others. Everything from the way we look to our friends, family, and beliefs can affect our perceptions of self, and the roles we are expected to play in society. All of these ideas are examined in Ydessa Hendeles' exhibition The Milliner's Daughter.

Outside In is a hands-on writing workshop that invites participants to consider different perspectives about outsiders and insiders, themselves and others. After a tour and discussion of Hendeles' exhibition. writers will be invited to create and share new pieces of flash fiction, poetry or memoir in response to openended exercises. The workshop's supportive structure encourages writers to share personal thoughts in a safe and non-critical environment The workshop is open to writers of all levels. Writing materials will be provided.

David Best is a writer, editor and long-time student of the creative process. He has worked with hundreds of Toronto-based writers in workshops including Writers' Boot Camp, The Novel and 10 Self-Portraits.

In From her wooden sleep..., an installation by Ydessa Hendeles, manikins from centuries past sit like a lifeless congregation in a gallery lit dramatically, evoking a house of worship or other sacred space.

A manikin is a shorthand form of the human figure. It sits or stands like you do, but it is stiff and static. It watches you as you watch it, but its eyes are wooden. It performs, being on display all day, every day; yet it lacks an individualizing identity. But what if the manikin came to life and performed? What would this wooden creature feel? Would it be accepted by human society—or not?

Award-winning dancer Arthur Stashak, who wowed the audience with his Summer 2016 performance titled *License to Disturb*, returns with new choreography inspired by Hendeles—and in keeping with the Golem from Jewish folklore, Olympia from Offenbach's "Tales of Hoffman"; Pinocchio from the Italian writingand-illustrating team of Collodi and Mazzanti; and, even the android Data from *Star Trek*

Ydessa Hendeles' exhibition The Milliner's Daughter explores the ways that communities gather by assembling found objects called "curatorial compositions". Hendeles uses these compositions as an avenue to open discourse about memory and its relationship to identity.


